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5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for public welfare:
 - A. Town poor.
 - B. Old age assistance.
6. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the town library.
7. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for patriotic purposes:
 - A. Old Home Day.
 - B. Memorial Day.
8. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for cooperation with the state in the control of white pine blister rust.
9. To raise and appropriate a sum equal to not more than one-hundredth of one per cent of the assessed valuation of the town based upon the assessment for the year 1940 for the purpose of advertising the attractions and resources of the town in connection with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee region.

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10. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the care and maintenance of public cemeteries.

11. To discontinue that portion of a certain town highway between a point easterly of The Glendon on the Warner-Webster town line and the site of the old Amesbury bridge over the Warner River.

12. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary when combined with an appropriation by the state for the reconstruction and improvement of the town highway, extending from Fitz's Corner to the Boscawen town line via Clothespin bridge and Dingit's Corner, said appropriation to be contingent upon an appropriation by the state for the same purpose.

13. To authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to borrow for the town by the issue of notes a sum not exceeding \$13,000 in anticipation of taxes for the year 1941, said notes to be expressly payable from said taxes within one year from the date of their issuance; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to determine the rate of interest on such notes and to provide for the sale thereof.

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14. To determine a new location for a town hall.

15. To authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to acquire by purchase or otherwise all land necessary and desirable for a town hall at such location, upon such terms and conditions as they deem expedient.

16. 17. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the purchase of the existing town hall building from the United States of America and for its removal to a new location.

18. To authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to construct and equip a new town hall building; to determine whether the new building shall include facilities for a public school;

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to authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to select plans and specifications for a new town hall building and to enter into a contract or contracts on behalf of the town for the construction and equipment of said town hall building with such person or persons as the Board of Selectmen may in their discretion determine.

19. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the purpose of constructing and equipping a new town hall building and acquiring all land necessary and desirable therefor.

20. To authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to borrow for the town by the issue of bonds a sum not exceeding \$11,500 to be used for the purposes specified in the preceding article; and to authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to determine the time and place of payment and the rate of interest on such bonds and to provide for the sale thereof.

21. To authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to make all necessary contracts and agreements on behalf of the town with the School District of Webster for the construction and equipment of the new town hall building and for the use of a portion of said building by said District for a public school, upon

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such terms and conditions as the Board of Selectmen may in their discretion determine.

24. To authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to sell and convey to the United States of America by good and sufficient deed, full title to the existing town hall and the land upon which it stands and any other real estate owned by the town, not including highways, within the flowage area of the Black Water River Flood Control Dam, upon such terms and conditions as the Board of Selectmen may approve.

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

It was voted to adopt the following resolution:

RESOLVED that the Board of Selectmen be and they hereby are authorized to sell and convey to the United States of America by good and sufficient deed full title to the existing town hall and the land upon which it stands and to any other real estate owned by the town, excluding highways, within the flowage area of the Blackwater River flood control dam, upon such terms and conditions as the Board of Selectmen may approve.

It was voted that, without limiting the discretion of the Board of Selectmen, the sense of the meeting was that the Board of Selectmen should accept the sum of \$10,000 from the United States of America for the Town Hall and the land upon which it stands.

It was voted to take up article 14.

It was voted that the new location for a town hall be determined by ballot vote and that those desiring the location to be at Corser Hill write "Corser Hill" on their ballots and those desiring the location to be at Sweatt's Mills write "Sweatt's Mills" on their ballots.

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The whole number of tickets given in was 104, upon which: Corser Hill had 52 votes and Sweatt's Mills had 52 votes. Upon a second balloting the whole number of tickets given in was 106, upon which: Corser Hill had 54 votes and Sweatt's Mills had 52 votes; and the moderator declared Corser Hill to be chosen as the new location for a town hall.

It was voted to authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to acquire by purchase or otherwise all land necessary and desirable for a town hall at Corser Hill upon such terms and conditions as they deem expedient. The vote by ballot was as follows: Yes, 57; no, 19.

It was moved and seconded that the town build a new town hall building and that said building include facilities for a public school, provided the school district concurs. It was moved and seconded to amend this motion by substituting the words, "that the town purchase the existing town hall building from the United States of America and secure its removal to a new location." On the motion to

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amend, the vote by ballot was as follows: Yes, 18; no, 55; and the amendment was rejected. The main question being, "Shall the town build a new town hall building, said building to include facilities for a public school, provided the school district concurs?", the vote by ballot was as follows: Yes, 46; no, 33. And the moderator declared the motion adopted.

It was voted to accept the offer of Ella Tarr of Contoocook to install a water system in the Riverdale Cemetery as a gift to the town.

It was voted to accept the offer of Jennie Tewksbury of Warner to give the sum of \$200 to the town in trust to use the income thereof for the care and maintenance of the Jesse Jackman lot in the Riverdale Cemetery.

It was voted to adjourn this meeting to the 12th day of April next at ten o'clock in the forenoon at the Grange Hall in Webster.

Blackwater Reservoir. Location of Old and New Cemeteries."

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(b) The transfer of said cemetery to the new site shall be accomplished to the extent and in the manner set forth in the specifications entitled "Specifications for Relocation of Old Meeting House Cemetery, Webster, New Hampshire."

(c) In addition to the appurtenances provided for in said specifications, a well shall be driven by and at the expense of the United States on the Corser Hill Cemetery lot, said well to be fitted with a two-inch galvanized pipe and a Myers double acting, self-priming hand pump set on a concrete curb four feet square and six inches in thickness at the base of the pump, the top of the curb to be flush with the ground. The location of the well and the quantity of the water it is capable of supplying shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Selectmen.

(d) In the event that the selectmen receive requests that re-interment of certain remains be made in some public cemetery within the town other than the one designated herein as the Corser Hill Cemetery, which choice for re-interment is accorded the nearest surviving relatives by Section 9, Chapter 55, Public Laws of New Hampshire, all such requests shall be transmitted to the District Engineer, United States Engineer Office, Park Square Building, Boston, Massachusetts not later than April 26, 1941, so that appropriate provisions for carrying out the requests may be included in the specifications referred to above in paragraph II(b).

(d) Upon the completion of the transfer of said cemetery to the new site, the Town of Webster shall be furnished by and at the expense of the United States with a card index and plan showing the number of each grave, the name of the person buried in each grave if known, the exact location of each remains within the limits of each burial lot or grave, and the date of re-interment.

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The plan and specifications referred to in paragraphs II(a) and II(b) are on file in the office of the Town Clerk and at the store of Arthur C. Stebbins, being two of the most public places in said town, and may be inspected there by all interested parties.

2. To take any action incidental to or in furtherance of the proposals contained in article 1.

Webster, N. H., March 11, 1941.

The Annual Town Meeting of the Town of Webster was called to order in the Old Town House by the Moderator, Arthur C. Stebbins, at 10:30 a. m. Prayer was offered by Rev. Hermon L. Sawyer.

After the reading of the Warrant, the business of choosing all necessary town officials was taken up as in Article 1.

It was voted to have the Clerk cast one ballot for Adam E. Mock to serve as Clerk for the ensuing year, and Mr. Mock was duly elected.

For Treasurer - the Clerk was instructed to cast one ballot for Edwin C. Gerrish and Mr. Gerrish was so elected.

For Selectman for three years, there were two candidates: Leslie E. Frost and Herman V. Wibel. Mr. Wibel received 21 votes and Mr. Frost 88. Leslie E. Frost was declared elected Selectman for three (3) years.

For Road Agent in District #1, there were two candidates: Nathan A. Mock and Sherman P. Stevens. Mr. Stevens received 45 votes and Mr. Mock 57 votes. Nathan A. Mock was elected Road Agent in District #1 for the ensuing year.

For Road Agent in District #2, the Clerk was instructed to cast one ballot for Daniel L. Holmes for the ensuing year and Mr. Holmes was so elected.

For Road Agent in District #3 there were three candidates: John H. Allen, Kenneth F. Hoar and Herman V. Wibel. Mr. Wibel received 1 vote; Mr. Allen received 40 votes and Mr. Hoar 74 votes. Kenneth F. Hoar was elected Road Agent in District #3 for the ensuing year.

For Tax Collector, the Clerk was instructed to cast one ballot for George E. Scribner and Mr. Scribner was elected for the ensuing year.

For Trustee of the Trust Funds, the Clerk was instructed to cast one ballot for Stuart Fifield and Mr. Fifield was elected for three years.

For Library Trustees, the Clerk was instructed to cast one ballot for Hermon L. Sawyer for Library Trustee for one year and he was so elected.

The Clerk was then instructed to cast one ballot for Stuart Fifield for Library Trustee for three years and Stuart Fifield was declared elected Library Trustee for three years.

(It was necessary to elect two trustees of the Library because of the resignation of two members)

(2)

For Auditors, the Clerk was instructed to cast one ballot for Walter G. Goodhue who was elected and one ballot for Wm. E. Phelps who was also elected both these gentlemen to serve for the ensuing year.

Under Article 2

The town voted to raise and appropriate \$3000 to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Under Article 3

a. The town voted to raise and appropriate one-half of one per cent of the total valuation for town maintenance.

b. The town voted to raise and appropriate \$100 for oiling roads.

c. The town voted to raise and appropriate \$2500 for plowing and sanding roads.

d. The town voted to raise and appropriate \$400 for general expense of the Highway Department.

(It was explained that this will include repairs to machinery, and new culverts where needed. It was suggested that the contractor at the Blackwater Dam whose heavy machinery broke culverts on the Little Hill Road, be asked to pay for same.)

Under Article 4

The town voted to raise and appropriate \$418.22 for Class V Road Construction.

Under Article 5

a. The town voted to raise and appropriate \$600 for town poor.

b. The town voted to raise and appropriate \$400 for old age assistance.

Under Article 6

The town voted to raise and appropriate \$100 for the Town Library.

Under Article 7

a. The town voted to raise and appropriate \$85 for Old Home Day.

b. The town voted to raise and appropriate \$35 for Memorial Day.

Under Article 8

The town voted not to raise \$400 for control of pine blister rust and also voted to pass this article over.

(3)

Under Article 9

The town voted to raise 1/100 of one per cent of the total valuation of the town which would be \$53, for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee project which advertises the attractions and resources of the town.

Under Article 10

Mr. Bert Tilton explained that the money obtainable from the Trust Funds might all be needed for the new cemetery and that as the fences at the Riverdale and Beaver Dam Cemeteries need painting, the town should raise money for this purpose. It was voted to lay this article upon the table to be taken up at the adjourned meeting.

Under Article 11

It was voted to discontinue that portion of a certain town highway between a point easterly of the Glendon on the Warner-Webster town line and the site of the old Amesbury bridge over the Warner river, subject to gates and bars.

Article 12

It was unanimously voted to lay this article on the table.

Under Article 13

It was voted to allow the Selectmen to borrow \$8000 in anticipation of taxes.

Under Article 14 & Article 15

It was voted to lay both these articles on the table for the present.

Under Article 16

In discussing this article, the Selectmen advised that the report had reached them that the government had offered \$10,000 for the Old Town House, but this had not been verified by Washington. It was voted to lay this article on the table temporarily and was then voted to take up Article 24.

Article 24

It was voted to leave the sale of the Town House to the Selectmen according to article 24. Some argument was introduced as to the price the Selectmen should accept. Mr. E. C. Gerrish wishes to leave it to the Selectment to do the right thing. Mr. Hermon Sawyer suggested a resolution that the Selectmen be advised to accept at least \$10,000. Previously the Selectmen said they had asked the Government for \$12,000 but never received an answer except the notice that the building was to be condemned

Mr. Shugrue then asked if the Government would build a building for us. Lawyer Upton replied that the Government would build no buildings. Mr. Hermon Sawyer then offered the resolution that we express the sentiment of the town by authorizing the Selectmen to accept \$10,000 if they can get it rather than let the Condemnation Proceedings be carried out.

Under Article 16

The question embodied in this article, it was explained, is whether the town is going to use this old building or have a new one. If the town votes to keep this building, the article for the new building can and will be passed over.

Mr. Hermon Sawyer said he had lived in two different towns without town halls, and as this town is at present so upset, he suggested and made the motion that we lay this article on the table. His motion was not in order and so did not go to a vote. Mr. Upton made the point that the Government would dispose of this building before we could decide later what action to take. It was then voted to lay Article 16 on the table temporarily and take up Article 14.

Under Article 14

The Selectmen explained that they had the Planning Board come up to look over the town for the possible sites desirable for a town hall. They recommended Corser Hill as a fine site for a Civic Center. Mr. Mock agreed that Corser Hill is a nice site, but he suggested that we consider the conditions resulting from a public hall. Corser Hill is a residential district and he questioned whether or not we want our hall there.

Mr. Phelps said that he had argued for a Town House on Corser Hill and still wanted it there. "There is no condition yet made," he said, "that the Town must let the Town Hall for Public Dances."

Mr. Wibel suggested that if the Town House is at Corser Hill the library will be a long way from the South part of the town.

The motion was made to have those who want the town house located on Corser Hill vote "Corser Hill" and those who want it at Sweatt's Mills vote "Sweatt's Mills".

Mr. Shugrue made the motion that this matter of choosing the site for the Town Hall be laid on the table until the roads are built. This motion took precedence over the other but it was voted not to lay the matter of a Town Hall site on the table.

The result of the first ballot on the choice of location for a Town Hall was 52 for Sweatt's Mills and 52 for Corser Hill.

The second ballot gave the result of Sweatt's Mills 52 and Corser Hill 54, thus making the Corser Hill Site the one chosen.

(5)

Mr. Frost then moved that the new Town Hall be located on the land of Eva Hall on Corser Hill. This motion was not carried.

Robert Pearson moved to adjourn the meeting, but this motion was not seconded.

The motion was then made to allow the Selectmen to buy land for the new Town Hall Site as they deemed it expedient. This was promptly seconded and the vote resulted in YES 57 NO 19. This motion was carried.

Under Article 18

The motion was made that the town build a new Town Hall and that the new building include room for school rooms. It was also suggested that we buy the old one and move it.

Mr. G. E. Scribner said that he would like to see a new town hall; he felt that we could not afford to move the old one. It would not be wise to maintain the old one as it is out of date, with no modern conveniences. If we start to modernize it, he felt it would cost too much. He would like to have a new Town Hall, with Library, Auditorium, Selectmen's rooms, etc. "We should give serious consideration to the matter before voting," he said, for we shall have to buy the old one, modernize it and move it. We have now no place for public entertainment. We have not a floor in town suitable for dancing."

Mr. Hermon Sawyer then said that he was born and brought up in Webster and his earliest recollections were many of them connected with the Old Town House. "I ought to have sentiment about this town hall if anyone has," he said, "but I do not think the boys and girls of the coming day will have those memories and this old building will not be as useful as a new building. It is a question of whether you want this for memories or a new one for the generations to come. For myself, I would feel sorry to see this taken down, sorry to see it go, but if I had children or grandchildren who would live here in the future, I should be in favor of something more suitable."

The motion to buy and move the Old Town House was put to a vote with the result YES (to buy it) 18 and NO(not to buy it) 55

The motion was made and this time seconded to build a new Town Hall. Mr. Hermon Sawyer made the motion to lay this motion on the table with a resulting vote in the negative.

Under Article 18 it was voted to build a new Town Hall, the vote being NO-33 and YES-46

A communication from Mrs. Ella Tarr had been received saying that she wishes to put some water system in the Riverdale Cemetery for the use of the town. She will put it in as a gift to the town and wanted some action taken upon it. It was voted to accept her offer.

Mrs. Jennie Tewksbury, of Warner, wishes to give \$200 for the care of the Jessie Jackman lot in the Riverdale Cemetery and the town voted to accept this gift.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:20 p m until April 12, 1941 at the Grange Hall, Webster, at 10:00 a m.

Voted \$200 for Election and Registration; \$1000 for General Expense; \$1500 for Expenses Town Hall and Other Town Buildings; \$1000 for Rent of Grange Hall; \$3900 for Police Department; \$2000 for Fire Department; \$2000 for Insurance; \$200, Planning and Zoning; \$500, Damages and Legal Expenses; \$200 for Civil Defense, \$1500 for Town Dump and \$1000 for Interest.

Unanimous vote 220
- Article 11. Discussion about the skating rink. (\$300 was requested for the maintenance of the playground and skating area). Voted down the article as read but \$300 was voted for Park and Playground.
- Article. 12. Voted to purchase a new fire truck for \$24,000, with \$20,000 to be used from Revenue Sharing Funds and a sum not to exceed \$4000 to be raised by taxes in 1973; Yes 122 No 25 This vote followed a lengthy discussion about the expenditure of the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund; William Phelps registered a protest to the Selectmen Concerning the procedure used in presenting the use of the Revenue Sharing Funds to the voters at this meeting, on the grounds they have been denied their right of a choice as to what this money should be spent for."
- Article 13. Following a report by Mrs. Geraldine Fereshetian, in behalf of the Pillsbury Lake Action Committee, the article to see if the town will vote to petition the N. H. State Tax Commission to re-value all taxable property of the Town, was voted to be tabled.
- Article 14. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee to recommend a sanitary landfill site and appropriate the sum of \$500 for

expenses.

Article 15. Voted to designate Bashan and Gerrish Roads from Dingit Co Corner to Deer Meadow Road and Blackwater Road as scenic, under the provisions of RSA 253:17 & 18, for the purposes of protecting and enhancing the scenic beauty of the Town of Webster.

Article 16. There was a discussion and vote relative to raising \$500 to aid in the support of the local kindergarten. This was defeated by a vote of 80 to 29.

Article 17. It was voted to change the name of the Webster Community Park to the William R. Pearson Memorial Park, in honor of "Bill" Pearson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Pearson, Jr. of Webster.

Article 18. Voted to authorize the establishment of a five member Parks and Recreation Commission whose members are to be appointed by the Selectmen for three years. First appointments to be less than 3 years to establish sequence of appointments.

Article 19. Voted to establish the term of road agent for a period of three years. First vote would be Town Meeting 1974.

Article 20. Voted to have the town authorize a Town Tax Map Committee and appropriate \$500. for expenses.

LAWS OF THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

Passed January Session, 1937

Chapter 175

AN ACT RELATING TO EXEMPTIONS FROM TAXATION

Section

1. Application of provisions

Section

2. Takes effect.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1. Application of Provisions. Amend section 25-a of chapter 60 of the Public Laws, as inserted by chapter 148 of the laws of 1931, by striking out said section and inserting in place thereof the following: 25-a. Improvements Only Exempted; Limitations. The exemptions referred to in sections 22, 24 and 25 of this chapter, as regards real estate hereafter acquired by such institutions, shall apply only to subsequent improvements therein and thereon, and the real estate so acquired shall be assessed and taxed as other similar land and real estate in the vicinity is assessed and taxed. This section shall not apply to real estate owned by religious societies incorporated or organized within this state and occupied by their pastors or clergy in active service or to real estate owned and occupied by the Grand Army of the Republic, the United Spanish War Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars, the American Legion, or to real estate acquired and used in substitution for property in this state theretofore exempt from taxation.

2. Takes Effect. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

This Supplemental Mortgage made this 7th day of Sept 1928 by and between New Hampshire Power Corp., a corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of New Hampshire party of the first part (hereinafter called the Company) and American Trust Company, a corporation organized and existing under the laws of Massachusetts, as Trustee, party of the second part (hereinafter called the Trustee)

Witnesseth, that

Whereas under date of Dec. 1 1923 the Company executed to the Trustee and duly recorded a certain indenture of Mortgage or deed of trust (hereinafter called the Indenture) to secure an issue of First Mortgage Six per cent, Sinking Fund Gold Bonds not to exceed \$12,000,000.00 principal amount outstanding and at any one time and

Whereas is and by said Indenture the Company granted, bargained, sold, conveyed, assigned, transferred, remised, released, mortgaged, franchised, and privileged the owned or thereafter acquired by the Company (except as therein stated) and agreed in and by Indenture to make execute acknowledge, deliver and record as often as requested by the Trustee any confirmations, renewal supplemental or other indenture any and other instruments or conveyances which in the opinion of the Trustee are or might be necessary to subject to the lien of said mortgage or deed of trust any property thereafter acquired by the Company; and

Whereas in accordance with the terms of said Indenture the Company on May 22, 1924 did issue bonds of Series A to the principal amount of six \$600,000.00, on June 27, 1924 Series A \$28,000.00 Nov. 4, 1924 Series A \$28,000.00; March 27, 1925 Series A \$44,000.00, July 22, 1925 \$10,000.00 October 28, 1926 Series A \$147,000.00 and

Whereas the Trustee under and by virtue of Section 4 of Art 5 of said indenture has requested the Company to make, execute, acknowledge, deliver and record a Supplemental Mortgage subjecting to the lien of said Indenture any property heretofore acquired by the Company and not already subject to the lien of said Indenture

All property, real, personal and mixed now owned or hereafter acquired by the Company, wherever situated (except as hereinafter expressly excepted) including, without in anywise limiting or impairing by the enumeration of the same the scope and intent of the foregoing or of any general description contained in this mortgage all lands, rights of way, roads, water rights and franchises, easements of flowage, water locations, appropriations, ditches, flumes, penstocks, reservoirs, reservoir sites, canals, dams, and dam sites, aqueducts, and all other rights or means for appropriating, conveying, storing and applying water, all electric and other power houses, gas plants and holders and other buildings and contents thereof, all power and building sites, turbines, water wheels, governors, boilers, engines, dynamo, generators, motors, converters, batteries, switches, steam, electrical, gas and other mechanical apparatus, equipments, pipes, dynamo pumps, tanks, fixtures, furniture, stores, supplies, automobiles, trucks, wagon and other vehicles, all lines for the transmission and distribution of gas and electric current for any purpose and all mains, pipes, pole, towers, wires, transformers, sub-stations, conduits, cables, insulators, street fixtures, switchboards, meters and other apparatus for use in connection therewith or otherwise and all rights, privileges and franchises to erect or lay said lines on over under through any public or private ways or lands or buildings and all leases, patents, rights, privileges, licenses, immunities and all rents, issues, profits and income from the property hereby conveyed or intended so to be located in the towns of Newfane, Sunapee, Hopkinton, Andover, Bennington, Canaan, Enfield, Hillsboro, Pittsfield and Bristol in the State of New Hampshire or elsewhere.

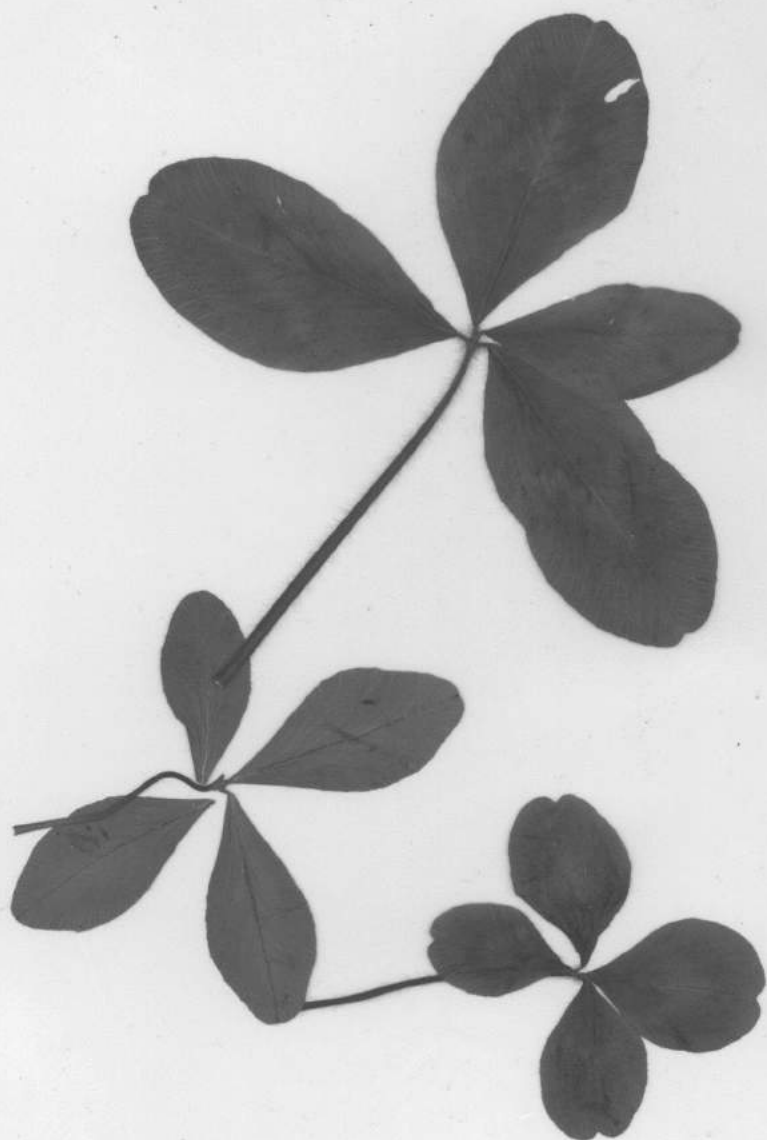
